# Vance County Committee Reports and Recommendations August 3, 2015

#### **Water Planning Committee**

Monthly Construction and Operations Reports (Phase 1A & 2A/2B). This committee (Garrison [absent], Taylor, Brummitt) met Monday, July 27<sup>th</sup> to review the monthly operational reports as well as to discuss final adjusting change orders within Phase 1A, additional road construction along the NC 39 South Corridor and to discuss refunds within Phase 2. The committee was informed that all work within Phase 1A has been completed and currently five crews are working within Phase 2. Recently, work has finished up on Flanagan Road, Terry Lane and Pine Trail and work is ongoing within Carolina Woods, Dabney Woods & Willow Creek Subdivisions and along Stagecoach Road and Waters Edge Road. As crews finish these, they will be moving to Somerset Plantation, Lakeshore Plantation and the end of Thomas Road within the next few weeks. Barring any weather delays, it is anticipated that all road additions should be complete within the timeframe required by USDA. For information only.

Final Adjusting Change Orders – Phase 1A Contract 1 & 2. The committee reviewed the final 2 change orders for Phase 1A. Both change orders are a reduction in the contract prices to account primarily for cost underruns within the rock allowances and to account for actual work performed. The contract 1 change order is a reduction of \$209,473.91, bringing the final contract 1 price to \$1,531,959. The contract 2 change order is a reduction of \$357,747.52, bringing the final contract 2 price to \$4,281,892. The committee also reviewed a budget summary for Phase 1A and recommended approval of both change orders. Recommendation #1: Approve Contract 1 - Change Order 8 Final for Phase 1A with HG Reynolds deducting the contract by \$209,473.91. Recommendation #2: Approve Contract 2 - Change Order 7 Final for Phase 1A with HG Reynolds deducting the contract by \$357,747.52.

Intent to Apply for USDA Grant Funds – Additional Road Construction. The committee discussed the additional grant funds that are being made available by USDA for the Rock Mill Road, NC 39 Hwy South, and Foster Road areas. USDA has requested that the Water Board go on record indicating their intent to apply for the funds. Previously, the County has been made aware that grant funds would be available for this work. If awarded, it is intended that the additional construction work would extend approximately five miles and would serve the 81 committed customers along this corridor. The committee members present felt it was in the best interest to defer to Commissioner Wilder as this area is within his district. In a follow up conversation with Commissioner Wilder, he has indicated his support to proceed forward with the grant request. Recommendation: Authorize staff to submit a USDA grant application for extension of waterlines along Rock Mill Road, NC 39 Hwy South, and Foster Road and authorize the chairperson to execute all grant related documents.

Refund of Early Signup Fees – Phase 2A & 2B. The Water Board previously (April 2014) approved issuing refunds in Phase 1A and also approved allowing residents within any phase who receive refunds to "reserve" the initial signup fee of \$125 if county water service is made available to them in the future. With construction wrapping up in Phase 2, it is necessary to take action authorizing the refunds along those roads that will not be included within the current project. The committee recommended proceeding with the issuance of refunds along the roads indicated in the attachments. Recommendation: Authorize staff to issue refunds in Phases 2A and 2B for those roads as presented where water will not be available for the foreseeable future.

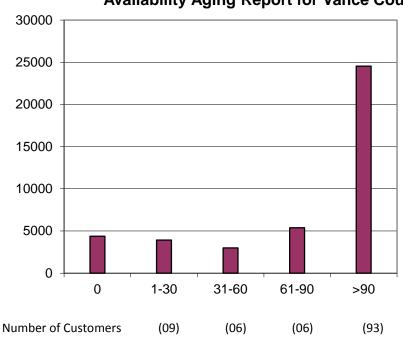
The current metered accounts in Phase 2 is 114, availability accounts will engage on 6/14/15, due to the 90 day grace period ending. Water services installed in Phases 2A and 2B is 279 connections; in Phase 2A, 173 services installed, in Phase 2B, 106 services installed. The signups in new road additions in Phase 2A is 90 and in Phase 2B is 99. There is a total of 1178 customers committed to the water system countywide.

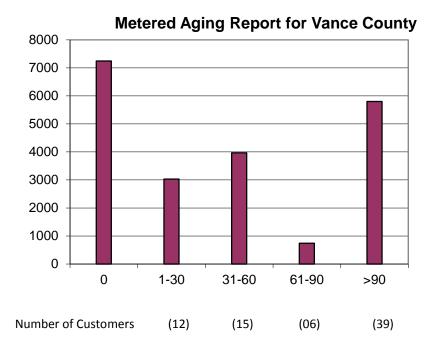


#### Vance County Water District Operations Report July 2015

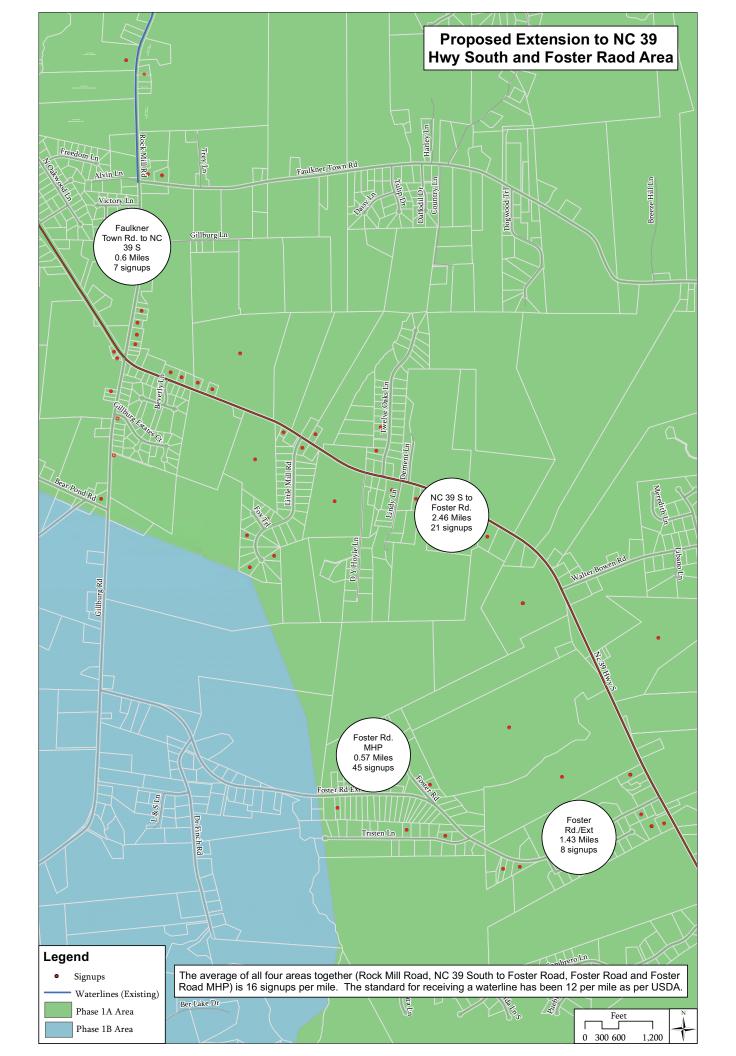

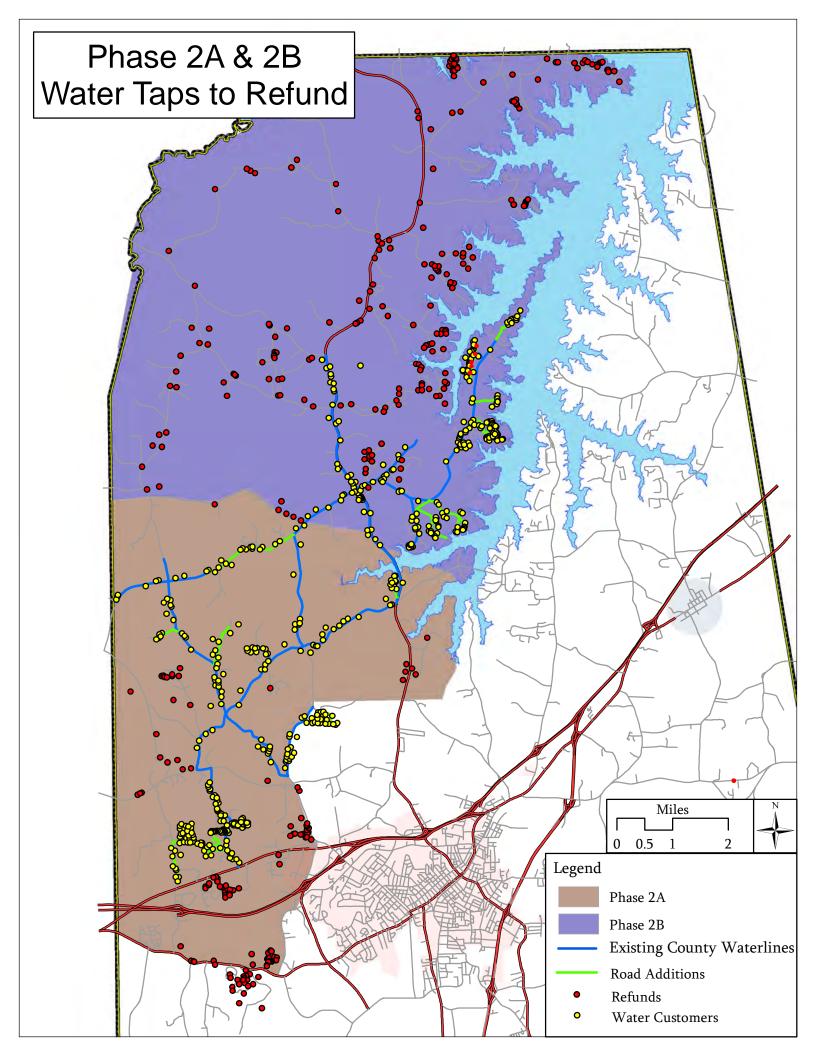

# Vance County Committee Reports and Recommendations August 3, 2015

#### **Human Resources Committee**

**Position Vacancies.** (A) The Maintenance Department has a position vacancy for a *Custodian*. An employee in this class performs manual labor involving a variety of building custodial, maintenance, and security tasks in the Administration and Courthouse buildings. (B) Fire & EMS has a position vacancy for a *Fire Engineer* in Fire Services. It is essential to the department's operation to fill this position to ensure a minimum staffing level of ten firefighters per shift. (C) The Jail has a position vacancy for a *Detention Lieutenant*. This supervisory position is critical to the safety and security of the Jail. [Recommendations are contingent upon endorsement by the Human Resources Committee.] Authorize the filling of the vacant positions as requested.

#### **Planning & Environmental Committee**

Approval for Sale of Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) Property (614 Andrews Avenue). The committee (Wilder [C], Garrison, Taylor) met Friday, July 10 to review an offer to purchase one of the remaining NSP homes located at 614 East Andres Avenue. Due to the time sensitive nature of responding to NSP offers, the Board during their March 10, 2014 meeting authorized the committee to make decisions on selling the NSP houses subject to the established price parameters. The offer was within these parameters and the committee has approved the sale of 614 East Andrews Avenue to Alicia Moore for \$65,000 subject to the County's standard counter offer including the terms and conditions of the NSP program. In order to finalize the sale, it is necessary for the full Board to adopt the attached resolution. Following the sale of this property and the previously approved sale for 611 Charles Street, the County will have one remaining NSP home to sell on Hawkins Drive. In addition to approving the sale of this property, the committee was made aware and briefly discussed 15 additional parcels that were acquired from the City of Henderson with the intent of being included in the NSP program. For all of these properties, NSP funds were used to acquire the property and/or to demolish blighted structures that were on the lots. Staff will be receiving further guidance from the State and will be following up with the committee as to what actions need taken on these properties to prevent closeout issues for the NSP Program. Recommendation: Approve resolution authorizing a Private Sale Pursuant to N.C.G.S 153A-378 of Low and Moderate Income Housing from the Vance County NSP Grant Program.

Neighborhood Stabilization Matters (Demolition and Removal of Properties from Program). The committee met Wednesday, July 22 to discuss 15 properties originally intended for the NSP program and to discuss one NSP property where a structure remains and demolition is necessary. The committee was made aware that the funding agency (DCA - Division of Community Assistance) will require the 15 properties to be put into an NSP eligible productive reuse or removed from the program to allow closeout of the grant once the final home sells. Also, no additional NSP funds are available to assist with putting the properties into productive reuse. The County has previously spent funds to either acquire the properties from the City and/or to demolish existing structures on the properties, but no homes were built back. At the direction of DCA with input from the committee, staff will be removing the properties from the NSP program. In addition to this, the committee reviewed one property (309 College Street) within the NSP program that is dilapidated and in need of demolition. Previously the Kerr-Tar COG (NSP Grant

administrator) has received three bids for the demolition. The committee recommended awarding a demolition contract to the low bidder, Faulkner Grading and Landscaping for \$15,400 to be utilized from the proceeds of NSP reimbursement funds. *Recommendation:* Approve demolition contract with Faulkner Grading & Landscaping for \$15,400 for the demolition of 309 College Street.

**Zoning Ordinance Amendment** – **Solar Regulations.** During their meeting July 22, the committee reviewed the proposed solar farm regulations which were recommended for approval by the Planning Board. The Planning Board once again recommended 100 foot setbacks surrounding the entire farm while the committee unanimously felt a compromise of 100 feet on the front and 50 feet on the side would be a better option for the setbacks. Additionally, the committee recommended increasing the fee for Solar Farm Conditional Use Permits from \$250 to \$400 to accommodate the additional required inspections within the ordinance amendment. In order to assist the board, staff provided the following options to be considered regarding the setbacks:

- 100 foot setback on all sides Planning Board recommendation
- 100 foot setback on the front and 50 foot setback on the sides Planning and Environmental Committee Recommendation
- Existing setbacks 50 feet on the front, 25 on the side, and 35 on the rear within AR zoning areas.

**Recommendation:** Schedule a Public Hearing – To be scheduled for the September board meeting as notice requirements were not met for the August meeting.

**Recommendation Following the Public Hearing:** Approve zoning ordinance amendment providing additional protections for solar farms inclusive of a 100 foot front setback and 50 foot side and rear setbacks.

**Recommendation:** Update the Planning and Development Department fee schedule increasing the conditional use permit fee from \$250 to \$400 for solar farms only.

#### **Education Committee**

*Use of School Facilities.* The Education Committee (Wilder [C], Garrison, Taylor) met on July 15 to follow up on a suggestion made by a citizen at the last board meeting that school gymnasiums and libraries be available for after school and summer use. The committee recognized that the issue would have to be taken up with the school board and discussed setting up a joint meeting of the commissioners and school board to discuss this issue and others. Noting that it has been many years since the two boards have met, the committee decided to invite the school board to a joint meeting to talk generally about education issues. Attached is the letter Chairman Taylor sent to the chairperson of the school board. *For your information*.

#### **General Government Committee**

Confederate War Memorial. The General Government Committee (Hester [C], Taylor, Wilder) met on July 15 to follow up on a suggestion made by a citizen at the last board meeting that the Memorial to the Confederate War Dead be removed from the grounds of the County Administration building. The committee discussed the issue, and, noting that the General Assembly was also discussing the matter, made no recommendation. The General Assembly has since passed and the Governor has signed Senate Bill 22, which effectively prohibits counties from moving monuments from public property.

#### **Properties Committee**

Inventory of REO Properties - Joint Property Maintenance and Demolition. The Properties Committee (Brown [C], Brummitt, Hester) met Wednesday, July 29 to review progress made on developing an inventory of County real estate owned properties and to consider a staff recommendation to provide an appropriation of \$15,000 (\$5,000 for grass and property maintenance & \$10,000 for building demolition) for jointly owned City and County properties. Staff reviewed a listing of properties along with information that has been gathered on 136 jointly owned properties as well as 57 county owned properties. The data collection included taking pictures of each property and was completed with City and County staff working together over the last few months. Staff has worked jointly with the City to prioritize eight jointly owned properties and 10 County owned properties that are in immediate need of demolition. It is anticipated that the appropriation could assist with the demolition of 2-3 jointly owned structures. Staff has already begun the process of applying for an abandoned mobile home grant that will address six County owned properties that have been prioritized for demolition. Two committee members discussed the need for a joint plan to address marketing and demolition/disposition of the properties. Additionally, a committee member mentioned the importance of considering the marketability of properties when prioritizing for demolition. The committee recommended that pictures be provided for the full board showing the properties that have been prioritized for demolition. The committee members were supportive of the appropriation with one committee member suggesting that only the \$10,000 be provided for the demolitions. Staff believes that a larger commitment will need to be made to these properties in the coming budget years, and would like to begin the process with this initial contribution. Recommendation: Approve Budget Amendment #3 appropriating \$10,000 for building demolition and \$5,000 for property maintenance of jointly owned City and County owned properties.

Offer to Purchase REO Property (205 Wilkins Lane). The committee also reviewed an offer to purchase a parcel of land owned by the county as a result of foreclosure. Staff provided information that included the offer of \$1,000 for the property consisting of a dilapidated 1968 model singlewide mobile home and overgrown lot. The committee reviewed photographs as well as the property condition, property value and costs incurred by the County for the property. The committee recommended proceeding with the upset bid process for selling the property. Recommendation: Approve resolution authorizing the upset bid process for the sale of 205 Wilkins Lane (Tax Parcel 0111-02002).

Offer to Purchase REO Properties (NC Hwy 39 North – Tax Parcel 0365 02045 & N. Williams Street – Tax Parcel 0070 01004A). The committee discussed a \$900 offer to purchase a wooded lot owned by the County in the Williamsboro area and also a \$900 offer for a wooded lot along North Williams Street. The committee members were interested in receiving additional information concerning the availability of water and sewer to the properties as well as whether septic tank permits are available for the properties. In reviewing the property locations, the committee was in favor of providing a counter offer to recoup the County costs for each property and is willing to consider higher offers for the properties as well. For Your Information.

**Building Needs Assessment and Space Study.** Previously the committee has discussed the need for a comprehensive approach in exploring options for the County's future building and space needs. Staff has informed the committee that the County lacks staffing and storage space for Social Services as well as storage space in general for other County departments. The committee reviewed a proposal from Architect Surapon Sujjanvanich and recommended that staff receive similar proposals from other architects who have recently done work with the County. *For Your Information*.

- **WHEREAS**, Vance County has received an Offer to Purchase 614 Andrews Avenue, Henderson, North Carolina; and,
- WHEREAS, In accordance with their adopted policy and procedures, the Planning and Environmental Committee duly met and approved an acceptable counter offer to Alicia Moore (Buyer) offer which has been accepted by the Buyers; and,
- **WHEREAS**, in accordance with Vance County's goals and requirements of the Vance County NSP grant the proposed Offer to Purchase should fulfill these goals and requirements subject to protecting the long term occupancy of the residence by the owner.

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners for the County of Vance as follows:

- 1. Pursuant to N.C.G.S. 153A-378 and the affirmative action taken by the Vance County Planning and Environmental Committee the Vance County Board of Commissioners will sell the property to Alicia Moore, the Buyer, pursuant to the terms and conditions contained in the executed Offer to Purchase at a sales price of \$65,000, with the following conditions in addition to those terms and conditions contained in the Offer to Purchase;
  - a. North Carolina Note and Deed of Trust in a second priority position securing \$5,000 for 5 years, with the balance due and owing decreasing by \$1,000 for each full year the residence is owned and occupied (owner-occupied) by the Buyer.
  - b. The Buyer fulfills all NSP requirements of education and counseling, and does fulfill the income requirements of the program.

- 2. A Notice summarizing the contents of such sale shall be published once at least ten days prior to the consummation of the sale.
- 3. This resolution shall be effective upon its adoption.

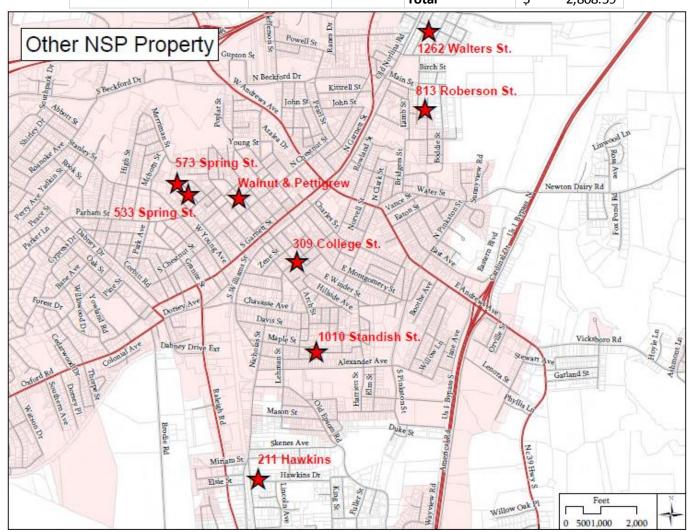

## ORDINANCE AMENDING THE VANCE COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL PROTECTIONS FOR SOLAR FARMS

**WHEREAS**, the Board of Commissioners has asked staff and the planning board to review the county's solar farm regulations; and

**WHEREAS**, the Vance County Planning Board has reviewed the proposed amendments to the Vance County Zoning Ordinance, has determined them to be consistent with the land use plan, and has provided a recommendation for their approval.

**WHEREAS**, the proposed amendments provide additional protections for property owners and citizens of the county while maintaining an environment conducive to economic development; and

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, that:

- A. The amendments as presented are consistent with the county land use plan by encouraging development at a rate and in a pattern which can be efficiently and effectively served by existing and planned services and facilities. Additionally the amendments accommodate and allow economic development and growth while protecting the environment, public health and general welfare.
- B. The Vance County Zoning Ordinance be amended as follows (deletions as strikethroughs, additions shown as underlined text):
  - 1) AMEND Section 6.10 N Solar Energy Systems, Large Scale (Solar Farms) as follows to add additional safety protections pertaining to setbacks, reflectivity and decommissioning:
    - 1. Height: Systems, equipment and structures shall not exceed twenty-five (25) feet in height when ground mounted. Excluded from this height requirement, however, are electric transmission lines and utility poles. Roof mounted systems shall not exceed the maximum height for the applicable zoning district.
    - 2. Setback: Active solar system structures must meet the following setbacks: Ground mounted—Ground mounted solar energy systems as part of a solar farm shall have a setback for all equipment including fences a minimum of 100 feet from street rights-of-way and other property lines. The Board of Adjustment may reduce such setback requirement if the proposed or existing buffer is sufficient to screen the project from view from adjoining properties or public rights-of-way. meet the minimum zoning setback for the zoning district in which it is located.
    - 3. Screening and Fencing: Adequate fencing shall be provided along the perimeter of the area (with all entrances gated) to prevent trespassing on the property. Systems, equipment and structures shall be fully enclosed and secured by a fence with a minimum height of 8 feet. A thirty (30) foot vegetative buffer consisting of a compact evergreen hedge or other type of evergreen foliage shall be required along the entire perimeter of the facility. The buffer shall be planted at a minimum of three (3) feet tall and reach the height of at least eight (8) feet within three years and shall be maintained in good condition. Failure to maintain the buffer shall constitute a violation of this ordinance. Earth-berms, other topographical features and existing wooded areas may be accepted in lieu of the above requirements, if they conceal the use from public view and are maintained.
    - 4. Lighting: If lighting is provided at the site, lighting shall be shielded and downcast such that the light does not spill onto the adjacent parcel or the night sky. Motion sensor control is preferred. all lighting shall be arranged and shaded so as to reflect the light away from adjoining properties and streets.
    - 5. Noise: Noise levels measured at the property line shall not exceed fifty (50) decibels when located adjacent to an existing residence or residential district.

- 6. Power Transmission Lines: To the extent practical, all new power transmissions lines to any building, structure or utility connection shall be located underground. Existing above ground utility lines shall be allowed to remain in their current location.
- 7. Approved Solar Components Installation and Design: Electric solar system components must have a UL listing and must be designed with anti-reflective coating(s). Individual arrays/solar panels shall be designed and located in order to prevent glare toward any inhabited buildings on adjacent properties as well as adjacent street rights-of-way.
- 8. Compliance with Building and Electrical Codes: All solar farms shall be in conformance with the requirements of the State Building and Electrical Codes (current addition), the State of North Carolina and Vance County. All active solar systems shall be inspected by a Vance County building inspector.
- 9. <u>Inspections: Each solar farm shall be required to have the facility inspected annually for 3 years following the issuance of the zoning permit to verify continued compliance with the Zoning Ordinance. Additional inspections necessitated by complaints or otherwise shall not replace the annual inspection requirement.</u>
- 10. Utility Notification: No grid tied photovoltaic system shall be installed until evidence has been given to the Planning and Development Department that the owner has been approved by the utility company to install an interconnected customer-owned generator. Off-grid systems shall be exempt from this requirement.
- 11. Abandonment <u>and Decommissioning</u>: It is the responsibility of the <u>solar system</u> owner <u>and landowner</u> to notify the County and to remove all obsolete or unused systems within twelve (12) months of cessation of operations. Reusable components are to be recycled whenever possible.

A decommissioning plan signed by the party responsible for decommissioning and the landowner (if different) addressing the following shall be submitted with the permit application.

- a. <u>Defined conditions upon which decommissioning will be initiated (i.e. end of land lease, no power production for 12 months, etc.)</u>
- b. Removal of all non-utility owned equipment, conduit, structures, fencing, roads, and foundations
- c. Restoration of property to condition prior to development of the solar farm.
- d. The timeframe for completion of decommissioning activities.
- e. <u>Description of any agreement (e.g. lease) with landowner regarding decommissioning.</u>
- f. The party currently responsible for decommissioning.
- g. Plans for updating this decommissioning plan.

C. The above amendments are effective upon adoption of	this ordinance.

#### RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING UPSET BID PROCESS FOR SALE OF REAL PROPERTY 205 Wilkins Lane, Henderson, NC 27536

WHEREAS, Vance County owns certain real property with an address of **205** Wilkins Lane, Henderson, North Carolina, and more particularly described by the Vance County Tax Department as Parcel Number **0111 02002**; and,

**WHEREAS**, North Carolina General Statute §160A-269 permits the county to sell real property by upset bid, after receipt of an offer for the property; and,

**WHEREAS**, the County has received an offer to purchase the real property described herein above in the amount of \$1,000.00 subject to the terms and conditions as included in the submitted offer to purchase bid, submitted by *Mekre Francis*; and,

WHEREAS, *Mekre Francis* has paid the required deposit in the amount of \$750.00 with his offer.

## THEREFORE, THE VANCE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS RESOLVES THAT:

- 1. The Board of County Commissioners declares the real property described above surplus and authorizes its sale through the upset bid procedure of North Carolina General Statute §160A-269.
- 2. A notice of the proposed sale shall be published which shall describe the property and the amount of the offer and shall require any upset offer be subject to the same terms and conditions as contained therein except for the purchase price.
- 3. Any person may submit an upset bid to the Clerk to the Board of County Commissioners within 10 days after the notice of sale is published. Once a qualifying higher bid has been received, that bid will become the new offer.
- 4. If a qualifying upset bid is received, a new notice of upset bid shall be published, and shall continue to do so until a 10-day period has passed without any qualifying upset bid having been received. At that time, the amount of the final high bid shall be reported to the Board of County Commissioners.
- 5. A qualifying higher bid is one that raises the existing offer by the greater of \$750 or ten percent (10%) of the first \$1,000.00 of that offer and five percent (5%) of the remainder of the offer and is subject to the same terms and conditions of the previous bid.
- 6. A qualifying higher bid must also be accompanied by a deposit in the amount of the greater of \$750 or five percent (5%) of the bid, which may be made by cash, cashier's check

or certified funds. The County will return the deposit of any bid not accepted and will return the bid of an offer subject to upset if a qualifying higher bid is received.

- 7. The terms of the final sale are that the Board of County Commissioners must approve the final high offer before the sale is closed and the buyer must pay with certified funds or wire transfer the bid amount and any other amounts as required pursuant to the terms and conditions of the bid at the time of closing, which shall be no later than 30 days following the approval by this Board of the final bid. The real property is sold in its current condition, as is, and the County gives no warranty with respect to the usability of the real property or title. Title will be delivered at closing by **a Non Warranty Deed**, subject to exceptions for ad valorem taxes, assessments, zoning regulations, restrictive covenants, street easements, rights of others in possession and any other encumbrances of record. Buyer shall pay for preparation and recording of the Deed and revenue stamps.
- 8. The County reserves the right to withdraw the property from sale at any time before the final high bid is accepted **and the right to reject all bids at any time**.
- 9. If no qualifying upset bid is received, the Board of County Commissioners will accept or reject the bid submitted within 60 days after the close of the 10-day upset period.

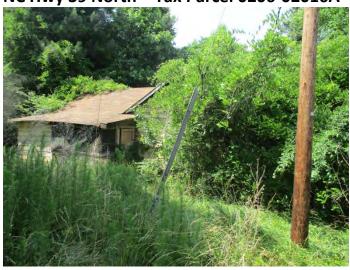

# County Manager's Report

## Vance County Interim County Manager's Report August 3, 2015

- **A. Proclamation National Health Center Week.** A memorandum from Ms. Denise Belle is attached, requesting the board of commissioners recognize the contribution of community health centers in providing affordable health care to underserved people throughout the country by declaring August 9 through August 15, 2015 as National Health Care Center Week in Vance County. *Recommendation: Approve the proclamation recognizing August 9 through 15, 2015 as National Health Center Week in Vance County.*
- **B.** Resolution Stepping Up Initiative. The attached memorandum from the NCACC Board of Directors requests all North Carolina counties to adopt a resolution supporting an initiative to reduce the number of mentally ill persons in county jails. The Sheriff has endorsed this initiative and we will follow up with his department on how this issue will be addressed in Vance County. **Recommendation:** Adopt the resolution as presented entitled Stepping Up Initiative to Reduce the Number of People with Mental Illnesses in Jail.
- C. Fox Pond Park Grant. Four Rivers Resource Conservation and Development Council, Inc. has received a \$50,000 grant for improvements at Fox Pond Park. When the grant was submitted, Vance County agreed to support the project by providing a local match. As we approach completing the final phase of this project, Four Rivers is requesting \$6,250 from Vance County to help accomplish the grant's goals and complete the boardwalk at Fox Pond Park. Of this amount, \$5,250 is required to complete the project within the current budget. The additional \$1,000 will serve as a contingency. The City will contribute an equal amount. This project is a community project with many organizations providing support. Vulcan Materials has donated 250 tons of rock, Perry Lumber Company is donating nearly \$4,000 in lumber, and the City of Henderson has donated staff and equipment use to the project, as well as financial support. Four Rivers has donated hundreds of hours of volunteer time to the project as well. This community support certainly highlights the community efforts to provide high quality facilities for its citizens. Attached are a copy of the grant application, grant budget and the support letter submitted by Vance County. *Recommendation: Approve attached budget transfer*.
- **D. Economic development Incentive Loan.** The Golden Leaf Foundation has asked the County to revise the previously approved loan agreement with Jerry's Artarama to insure that its funds are used in a manner that is fully compliant with IRS regulations. As you will read below, the revised agreement is actually more favorable to the County.

The agreement approved by the Board of Commissioners on July 6 provided for a \$600,000 interest free, sixty month loan to Jerry's that would be used by the company to purchase equipment for the new Vance County facility. The loan funds came from two

sources; \$400,000 from Golden Leaf and \$200,000 from Industrial Park funds. The loan is conditioned upon the company investing \$3,000,000 in the construction of a 60,000 square foot manufacturing and storage facility and hiring thirty additional full time employees.

The amount of the loan, its term and its purpose remain unchanged in the revised agreement. The only change is that the new agreement will include an interest bearing rather than an interest free loan for the \$400,000 Golden Leaf sourced funds. The \$200,000 Industrial Park sourced funds will remain interest free. The total amount of interest is fairly nominal, with a 1.75% rate compounded monthly. The total amount of interest paid over the life of the loan will be \$18,046.59. The interest paid will stay with the County.

Late last week, we were informed by the Golden Leaf Foundation that its \$400,000 portion of the loan cannot be interest free. The Golden Leaf Foundation is incorporated as a non-profit and must adhere to certain IRS regulations in order to retain its non-profit status. We were told that in order to strictly adhere to IRS regulations, "Golden Leaf funds must be used for charitable purposes and must not be used in a way that creates impermissible private benefit for individuals or for profit companies." Since the Golden Leaf funds will be loaned to a for-profit company, the loan must include interest to avoid the possibility that the company will be found to have received impermissible private benefit. The change in the approved agreement has little impact, and the Jerry's management has agreed to the revision. *Recommendation:* Approve revised economic development loan agreement with Jerry's Artarama, and authorize the Chairman to execute the agreement.

"Stepping Up Initiative to Reduce the Number of People with Mental Illnesses in Jails"

- **WHEREAS**, counties routinely provide treatment services to the estimated 2 million people with serious mental illnesses booked into jails each year; and
- **WHEREAS**, prevalence rates of serious mental illnesses in confinement facilities are three to six times higher than for the general population, with statistics showing that almost 13% of North Carolina's prison population requires some type of intervention due to mental health issues; and
- **WHEREAS**, almost three-quarters of adults with serious mental illnesses in jails have cooccurring substance use disorders; and
- **WHEREAS**, adults with mental illnesses tend to stay longer in jail and upon release are at a higher risk of recidivism than people without these disorders; and
- **WHEREAS**, county jails spend two to three times more on adults with mental illnesses that require interventions compared to those without these treatment needs; and
- WHEREAS, without the appropriate treatment and services, people with mental illnesses can continue to cycle through the criminal justice system, often resulting in tragic outcomes for these individuals, their families, and their communities; and
- **WHEREAS**, county jails are generally an unsafe environment for those with mental health treatment needs; and
- **WHEREAS**, the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners has undertaken a serious effort to address the local service needs of those with mental illnesses through the appointment of a special Task Force; and
- **WHEREAS**, Vance County, like all counties, takes pride in our responsibility to protect and enhance the health, welfare and safety of our residents in efficient, safe, and socially just ways; and
- **WHEREAS**, through the Stepping Up Initiative, the National Association of Counties, the Council of State Governments Justice Center and the American Psychiatric Foundation are encouraging counties to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in county jails.

#### **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Vance County Board of Commissioners:

- 1. That the Board of Commissioners does hereby sign on to the Call to Action to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in our county jail and commits to sharing lessons learned with other counties in North Carolina and across the country to support the Stepping Up Initiative; and
- 2. That the Board of Commissioners will utilize resources available through the Stepping Up Initiative and other resources provided by the Council of State Governments Justice Center to convene a diverse team of leaders and decision makers from multiple agencies who are committed to safely reducing the number of people with mental illnesses in jails, and
- 3. That this team will utilize the comprehensive resources available through the Stepping Up Initiative to develop a plan to reduce the number of people with mental illness in the county jail for 2016-2020, consistent with the Council of State Governments Justice Center report and recommendations, to be presented to the Board of Commissioners at its first meeting in December 2015.

#### **EQUIPMENT LOAN AGREEMENT**

THIS LOAN AGREEMENT (this "*Loan*") is made as of the 3rd day of August, 2015 (the "*Effective Date*"), by and between Vance County (the "*County*"), a political subdivision of the State of North Carolina, and **Jerry's Artarama N. C. Inc.**, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of North Carolina (the "*Company*").

#### **RECITALS**

The Company operates an art supply sales and distribution facility in Vance County, North Carolina, and is expanding its current operations as well as developing a frame manufacturing and sales division. The County has previously received a grant from The Golden L.E.A.F. (Long-term Economic Advancement Foundation), Inc., the purpose of which is to enable the County to provide Economic Development activity which will secure the development and expansion of infrastructure, tax base, employment and career opportunities for its citizens. The County has agreed to provide an interest free loan to the Company in the amount of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) and another loan in the amount not to exceed Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000) for the purchase of new equipment, fixtures and machinery in exchange for the promised investment of at least three million (\$3,000,000.00) in the construction of at least a 60,000 square foot manufacturing and storage facility and the hiring of 30 additional full time jobs by the Company.

The County has determined that the use of the Grant for the purposes set out above and as more fully set out herein are for a public purpose and constitute an economic development incentive appropriation which is authorized under NCGS §158-7.1. The County has the authority to enter into this Loan as provided herein pursuant to the provisions of NCGS §158-7.1.

The County has also determined that the use of the Grant for such purposes will lessen the burden of government in the following ways, by way of illustration and not limitation: new jobs will be created reducing unemployment; manufacturing, agricultural enterprises and other business are promoted which supports a viable economy; and taxable property is added to the tax base which increases potential tax revenue and reduces pressure to increase taxes. The general health and welfare of the citizens of the County and the State of North Carolina is enhanced as a result of the creation of new jobs and the retention of existing jobs and as a result of supporting the viability of major segments of Vance County, North Carolina's economy.

**NOW THEREFORE**, in consideration of the agreement of the County to loan to the Company, the Company's agreement to provide for additional jobs and expansions, and upon the mutual promises of the parties herein contained, the County, and the Company agree as follows:

1. DEFINITIONS. The following definitions apply to words used in this Lease Agreement:

"Default" means an incident or event which triggers remedies against the Company for breach of this Loan as set out in Section 12 of this Agreement.

*"Economic Development Performance Obligations"* means those obligations of the Company set out in Section 14 of this Lease.

"Effective Date" has the meaning set forth in the preamble hereto.

"Encumbrance" means any lien, pledge, encumbrance, collateral assignment or hypothecation.

*"Equipment"* means the equipment set out in <u>Exhibit A</u> to be purchased by the Company with the Loan Proceeds pursuant to this agreement.

"Facility" means the Company's future location at Peter Gill Road (part of Tax Parcel ID# 0457 01002), Henderson, North Carolina wherein a 60,000 square foot building will be constructed.

"Foundation" means The Golden L.E.A.F. (Long-term Economic Advancement Foundation), Inc.

"Loan" means this Loan Agreement, the \$200,000 Promissory Note and the \$400,000 Promissory Note as amended from time to time.

"Loan Payment Commencement Date" means the date that is ninety (90) days after the earlier of the certificate of occupancy being issued for the New Building or the newly acquired machinery and equipment is put into service.

"Loan Term" means sixty (60) months, beginning on the Loan Payment Commencement Date.

"Purchase Order" means the purchase order or orders, as the context requires, prepared by the Company for the purchase of the Equipment, fixtures and machinery.

"Qualified Job" means a full time position with the Company at their Vance County operations, that provides at least one half of the cost of the employee's health insurance plus all benefits to which similarly situated full time employees of the Company are entitled. A full time position is a position that provides at least 1,600 hours of work during a twelve month period.

"Uniform Commercial Code" means the Uniform Commercial Code set out in Chapter 25 of the North Carolina General Statutes.

2. PURCHASE AND SHIPPING OF EQUIPMENT, MACHINERY AND FIXTURES. The Company will use the Loan funds to purchase the Equipment, Machinery and Fixtures to be installed and utilized in the new Facility. The Company will provide the County with Purchase Orders and Invoices for the items to be acquired with the Loan Funds for approval. Loan funds shall be used only for the purposes described above and shall <u>not</u> be used

for any other purposes including, without limitation, the following: (i) the cost of installing the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures in the Facility, (ii) the cost of modifications to the Facility which are or maybe necessary to accommodate the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures, or (iii) the cost of providing electrical service or other utilities at the Facility necessary to operate the Equipment or Machinery. The County has no obligation to supply funds to purchase Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures other than the Loan Agreement, and the Company shall provide any funds in excess of the Loan Agreement that are necessary to complete the acquisition of such items.

- 3. NO WARRANTIES. The County is neither a seller nor manufacturer of the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures and shall not be deemed as such by the Company. The County makes NO WARRANTIES, EITHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, WITH RESPECT TO THE EQUIPMENT, MACHINERY AND FIXTURES. ALL EXPRESS WARRANTIES AND ALL IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF ANY KIND, INCLUDING IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY OR FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE ARE EXPRESSLY WAIVED. The Company represents that it has read and understands this section and acknowledges that the County makes no warranties, express or implied, with respect to the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures.
- 4. WAIVER OF REMEDIES AND DAMAGES AGAINST THE COUNTY, REMEDIES AGAINST SELLER.
- 4.1 Waiver of Remedies and Damages as to the County. The Company waives all causes of action it might have, and all rights to damages it might have against the County arising from or related to this Loan Agreement whether arising under the Uniform Commercial Code or other applicable law. The Company acknowledges that for all purposes pertaining to this Loan Agreement and the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures, the County is not a seller or manufacturer of the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures. The Company's waivers of claims against the County shall not constitute waivers of any claims the Company might have against the seller of the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures under the Uniform Commercial Code or other applicable law.
- 4.2 The Company's Remedies as to Seller of Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures. The parties do not intend by this Loan Agreement to limit the Company's rights against a seller for non-conforming Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures. The County will cooperate reasonably with the Company to enable the Company to enforce any remedies it might have under the Uniform Commercial Code against a seller arising out of the sale of the Equipment; however, the Company will reimburse the County for reasonable costs incurred by the County in rendering such assistance.
- 5. LOAN AMOUNT, ADJUSTMENT OF LOAN AMOUNT AFTER DISBURSEMENT.
- 5.1. *Loan Amount*. The loan amount shall be the total amount of Disbursements made to the Company for the purchase of Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures to

be used in the expansion of the company at the new Facility prior to the Loan Payment Commencement Date.

- 5.2 Disbursement of Loan Proceeds. The company will provide to the County a copy of the Purchase Order for all proposed acquisitions and additional supporting information as may be requested to insure all proceeds are to be used for the purchase of Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures in the new facility. The Loan proceeds shall be disbursed on the \$200,000 Promissory Note first, and upon full disbursement of said Note amount, shall then be disbursed on the \$400,000 Promissory Note. All disbursement requests for Loan Proceeds shall be submitted on or before the Loan Payment Commencement Date.
- 5.3 Rejection of Equipment, Refunds, Effect on Loan, Adjustments. If the Company rejects any of the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures or if the purchase price of any Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures or any cost paid with Loan funds is refunded in full or in part, the effect on Payment shall be as follows:
- 5.3.1 *Refunds*. Refunds of all or any part of the purchase price of Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures shall be repaid to the County. If the Company receives any refund, it will immediately deliver such refund to the County. Refunds of any part of costs paid with Loan Funds shall be paid by Company to the County.
- 5.3.2 Refunds of Purchase Price or Costs. If the County receives a refund of any part of the purchase price paid for rejected Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures or of costs originally paid with Loan funds, then the Loan Amount shall be reduced by such amount less any portion of such refund which is expended by the Company on replacement Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures, provided the Company has provided the County with a Purchase Order, and the same has been approved. Adjustments shall be made by reducing the payment by an amount sufficient to account for any refund received by the County and not reapplied of purchase of additional or replacement Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures. The Term of the Loan shall not be reduced.
- 5.3.3 *Purchase Price Not Paid.* If the County has not disbursed the purchase price for Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures rejected, then the purchase price of such Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures shall not be included in the calculation of payment under Section 7.
- 6. LOAN TERM. The term of this Loan shall be a period of sixty (60) months, beginning on the first day of the month following the Loan Payment Commencement Date.
- 7. PAYMENT. The Payment shall be one sixtieth of the total Loan Amount disbursed to the Company; to wit the amount which shall be the aggregate purchase price and costs of the Equipment, Machinery and Fixtures actually paid by the Company less any refunds. The Payment shall be made in equal monthly installments, due on or before the first day of every month following the Loan Payment Commencement Date. The parties may execute a

Commencement Memorandum or similar document establishing the monthly payment following acquisition of the Equipment, Machinery or Fixtures.

- 8. PAYMENT, NO PAYMENT ABATEMENT, LATE PAYMENT INTEREST. The first monthly payment shall be due on the first day of the month following the Loan Payment Commencement Date and each successive monthly payment shall be due on the same date of each month thereafter until the Loan is fully paid. Payment shall made payable in collectable US funds and shall be delivered to the County at its Notice Address. The obligation to make payments is not subject to any abatement, reduction, setoff, defense, counterclaim or recoupment due or alleged to be due to, or by reason of, any past, present or future claims which the Company may have against the County, the manufacturer or seller of the Equipment, or against any person for any reason whatsoever. In addition to constituting a Default, a monthly payment that is not paid when due shall accrue interest at the legal rate of six percent (6%) per annum until paid.
- 9. THE COMPANY'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE COLLATERAL: The Company, at its expense, shall have the following continuing responsibilities for the Equipment, Machinery and Fixtures during the Lease term.
- 9.1 *Up-fitting Facility*. Promptly and properly up-fit the Facility for the project contemplated in material compliance with all applicable laws, codes, rules and regulations so that the Collateral can be promptly installed and made operational.
- 9.2 *Installation.* Upon completion of the up-fitting of the Facility and acceptance of the Collateral, the same shall be immediately installed and made operational. A copy of all owner's documentation including but not limited to owner's manuals, installation diagrams, maintenance requirements and parts lists shall be provided to County upon request.
- 9.3 *Maintenance and Repair*. Constantly maintain the Collateral in good working condition and repair in accordance with the requirements of the seller's operating manual and best business practices. Broken, damaged or worn out parts will be replaced as necessary to keep the Collateral operational. Maintenance records shall be accurately kept and provided to County upon request.
- 9.4 *Insurance*. Insure the Collateral against casualty, loss or damage by reason of insurable hazard, including theft with a company reasonably acceptable to the County, and cause the County to be listed as the loss payee for the Collateral. The policy of insurance shall require the insurer to give written notice to the County at least thirty (30) days prior to any cancellation of the required coverage. The Company shall provide to the County annually a certificate of insurance evidencing that the required coverage is in effect. Insurance proceeds from a covered loss shall be used to repair or replace damaged Collateral unless the parties agree otherwise.

- 9.5 *Taxes*. Timely pay all ad valorem taxes, or other taxes or assessments levied upon the Collateral.
  - 9.6 *Removal.* The Collateral shall not be removed from the Facility.
- 9.7 *No Liens*. Permit no liens or security interests to attach to the Collateral other than the security interest of the County.
- 9.8 *Notification of Problems*. Promptly notify the County in writing of any problems with or damage to the Collateral.
- 10. SECURITY INTEREST. The Company also grants to the County a first lien security interest in the Collateral and takes possession of the Collateral subject to the security interest retained by the County. The Company shall execute such UCC filing statements and UCC Fixture filing statements as the County reasonably requires. The Company shall not impair the County's first lien security interest.
- 11. REPRESENTATIONS OF THE COMPANY. The Company makes the following present and continuing representations to the County.
- 11.1 Legal Existence. It is a duly formed and validly existing corporation under the laws of the state of North Carolina. It is in good standing and the corporate power and authority and the legal rights to execute, make, deliver and perform its obligations under this Lease.
- 11.2 Legal Authority. It has taken all actions necessary to authorize, consummate and implement the transactions contemplated under this Loan Agreement and has properly authorized the person executing this Loan Agreement to do so as the binding act of the Company.
- 11.3 No Legal Action. It has no actual knowledge of any legal or administrative proceedings pending or overtly threatened against or affecting it which would materially adversely affect its financial position or its ability to perform its obligations under this Loan Agreement.
- 11.4 *No Conflict*. The Loan Agreement, and the performance of its obligations thereunder do not conflict with, or result in a violation of its organizational documents or any applicable provision of statutory laws or regulations, or, to the best of its knowledge, any provision of any loan agreement or other agreement to which it is a party or by which any of its properties are bound. The execution, delivery and performance of the Loan Agreement by it (i) do not and will not violate or conflict with any court order, injunction or any agreement known to the Company and by which it is bound, and (ii) will not result in the creation or imposition of any lien, charge or encumbrance upon any of its assets, except as set forth or contemplated by the terms of this Lease.

- 11.5 No Adverse Knowledge. It has no knowledge of any adverse circumstance or condition, financial or otherwise, which would materially affect its ability to perform its obligations under this Lease.
- 12. DEFAULT. Each of the following is a Default under this Loan Agreement which triggers the remedies set out in Section 13:
- 12.1 The Company fails to make any payment due hereunder within ten (10) days of the due date.
- 12.2 The Company fails to perform any of its obligations or duties under this Loan Agreement, other than its Economic Development Performance Obligations, and such failure is not cured within ten (10) days of written notice from the County to the Company of such incident of Default.
- 12.3 The Company becomes insolvent, dissolves or is dissolved, assigns its assets for the benefit of creditors or enters, voluntarily or involuntarily, into any bankruptcy or other reorganization proceeding.
- 12.4 The Company becomes unauthorized to transact business in North Carolina.
- 12.5 The Company ceases operation of its business at the Facility. The Company shall be determined to have ceased operations of its business at the Facility if, during the Loan Term, more than 30 Qualified Jobs created by the Company are eliminated or reduced to part-time or if, during the Loan Term, the Company has substantially ceased operating the Facility for the purposes contemplated within this Loan Agreement.
- 12.6 The Company merges with or is acquired by any other entity without the express written consent of the County which consent will not be unreasonably denied or delayed.
- 12.7 Any material representation by the Company under this Loan Agreement becomes untrue in any material way.
- 12.8 The Company fails to timely pay to the County Compensation Amounts which become due under Section 15 of this Lease.
- 13. REMEDIES. Upon Default, the County shall have the right, in its discretion, to exercise the remedies set out herein which remedies may be exercised individually, collectively or cumulatively without prejudice to the right to exercise any other remedy. The failure by the County to exercise any remedy upon a Default shall not constitute a waiver of that Default or any other Default.

- 13.1 *Demand Repayment in Full.* The right to accelerate the Loan and demand immediate repayment of all amounts outstanding on the Loan.
- 13.2 Foreclose Security Interest. The right to (i) have the Collateral delivered to the County at a secure place designated by the County; (ii) if the Company fails to deliver the Collateral, the right to enter the Facility and remove the Collateral without legal process or notice free from any claim of trespass or claim for damages; (iii) the right to sell the Collateral under commercially reasonable terms and exercise all remedies of a secured creditor provided under Article 9 of the Uniform Commercial Code and to deduct from the sales proceeds the costs of sale including reasonable attorney fees, court costs, costs of storage, costs of repossession, repair costs, late payment interest as provided in Section 8 of this Loan Agreement and all other expenses reasonably incurred in exercising this remedy, the net proceeds will apply against any other sums due the County from the Company.
- 13.3 Demand Payment of the Compensation Amount. The right to demand that the Company pay the Compensation Amount as determined under Section 15 of this Loan Agreement. For purposes of determining the Compensation Amount owed by the Company as a result of a default (other than a default for failure to pay the Compensation Amount), the Compensation Amount shall be calculated using the method set forth in Section 16, with the number of Qualified Jobs being those Qualified Jobs that existed as of the last employment report provided by the Company pursuant to Section 14 prior to the occurrence of the event of default.
- 13.4 *Recover the Collateral*: The right to enter the Facility with or without force and recover the Equipment.
- 13.5 *Other Remedies*. The right to exercise any other remedy as provided at law for breach of contract or in equity.
- 14. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PERFORMANCE OBLIGATIONS. The Company shall have the following Economic Development Performance Obligations, each of which is a separate and independent obligation:
- 14.1 Job Creation Requirement. To create and maintain thirty (30) new Qualified Jobs at the Facility with an annual wage of no less than the rate currently paid to equivalent employees, no later than 12 months after the Loan Payment Commencement Date. The Company shall supply NCUI-101 forms to the County on a quarterly basis, or such earlier time as the County may request, and shall provide such other data as the County requests that is reasonably necessary to verify that the Qualified Jobs created by the Company satisfy this Job Creation Requirement. Within thirty (30) days of the Effective Date, the Company shall give to the County current job data in form and substance sufficient to provide a baseline for determining the fulfillment of the new Qualified Job requirement.

- Verification. The Company agrees to maintain full, accurate and verifiable records, supporting documents, and all other pertinent data reasonably necessary to verify whether it has satisfied its requirements contained in this Lease (the "Records"). The Company agrees to make the Records available to the County and/or its agents, designees, or representatives, and agrees to allow the County and/or its agents, designees, or representatives to audit, examine, and copy the Records. Such examination of the Records shall take place at the Company's offices in the County or at such other place to which the parties mutually agree. The Company may designate portions of the Records "Trade Secret" and confidential as permitted under North Carolina law, though such designation shall not limit access to such Records. The Records may be redacted to eliminate social security numbers of the Company's employees and other personal information regarding employees that is not reasonably necessary to determine the Company's compliance with its obligations under this Agreement. Access to the Records shall be allowed upon request at any time during normal business hours and as often as the County or its representatives may reasonably deem necessary. In the event that the Company fails to provide access to the Records in accordance with this Section 14.2 within thirty (30) days after the County delivers written request to the Company for such access, the County shall be entitled to recover one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per day, beginning on the 31<sup>st</sup> day after such demand is received, until the Company provides access to the Records as required.
- 15. COMPENSATION REQUIREMENT FOR FAILURE TO MEET ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PERFORMANCE OBLIGATIONS. If the Company fails to meet the Job Creation Requirement under Section 14, it shall be obligated to compensate the County the amount of unpaid interest that would have accrued on the Loan amount since the date of disbursement at the annual percentage rate of six percent (6%) per year through the date of Default and increasing the monthly payment to include paying the unpaid interest amount accrued on the outstanding amount of the Loan at the same interest rate (six percent 6%) for the balance of the Loan Term (the "Compensation Amount"). The Compensation Amount will be determined as soon as practical after default, and shall be paid to the County in equal monthly installments sufficient to fully pay the Compensation Amount over the remainder of the term of the Loan. Such installments shall be due the same date as the monthly payments are due, shall begin the month after the Compensation Amount is determined, and shall be considered as part of the required monthly payment. The provisions of this Section 15 are intended to meet the requirements of NCGS §158-7.1 (h).
- 16. ADDITIONAL OBLIGATIONS OF THE COMPANY. In addition to the other obligations and duties of the Company under this Loan Agreement, the Company shall have the following additional obligations and duties:
- 16.1 *Good Faith.* To act in good faith and to exercise reasonable diligence and promptness in fulfilling its duties and obligations hereunder.
- 16.2 *No Adverse Action.* To not knowingly take any action which would cause the Company to be in violation of this Agreement.

- 16.3 *Compliance with Loan Agreement.* To comply in all material respects with all of its obligations under the Agreement.
- 16.4 *Compliance with Laws*. To comply in all material respects with all applicable laws, rules, regulations, OSHA safety requirement, insurance requirements, worker's compensation insurance requirements, use of E-Verify as required pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 64 of the North Carolina General Statutes and other such legal requirements pertaining to the operation of its business.
- 16.5 *No Discrimination.* It shall not discriminate by reason of age, race, ethnicity, religion, color, sex, national origin, or handicap related to the operation of its business.
- 17. NOTICE REQUIREMENTS. Unless otherwise provided herein, all notices and other communications which may be or are required to be given or made by any party to the other in connection herewith shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been properly given and received on the date delivered in person or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified, return receipt requested, to the addresses set out below, unless such address is changed by written notice to the other party:
